# CITY MANAGER'S UPDATE

### August 31, 2023

#### Message from the Manager:

The biggest mentor in my life was my Father. My Dad came from humble beginnings being the son of a sharecropper in Geneva County, Alabama. While he graduated from high school, he had to drop out of college so he could work full time to make ends meet. He ultimately got a job at what was at the time Fort Rucker where he worked for over 40 years on helicopters. I can say we never had to worry about having a roof over our heads, clothes, or food – both of my parents were hard workers and excellent providers. My Dad's wisdom was only exceeded by his humility. He was the humblest person I have ever known. He had simple ways of sharing wisdom with me that continue to guide me to this day. I recently shared one of my Dad's lessons with a dear friend and it meant so much to them that it has been on my heart to share with you. This lesson I'll title "If Life Gives You Lemons Take an Orange."

After graduating high school, I lived at home with my parents and completed my freshmen year of college at a local junior college. I am and have always been an avid hunter. One of my best friends, who was working a couple jobs to make ends meet, had an unexpected day off and stopped by my house in the predawn hours to see if I could slip away for a hunt. My Dad was up very early every day due to his work schedule. Not knowing my friend was coming that morning I was fast asleep, but my Dad came and woke me up. I remember him saying "I know you didn't have plans to hunt today but John is here, and he does not get many chances to go, so hop on up and take him." I begrudgingly got up and shook the sleep off as best I could and began to dress and gather my hunting gear. As I was carrying my gear out to my truck, I passed my Dad having his morning coffee in the kitchen. Growing up not far from the Florida line my parents often stopped and bought fresh fruits and produce. As I walked by my Dad, he asked me "hey, you want to take some of these fresh oranges with you to eat later." I was tired and probably a bit irritated that my friend had not called me the night before and I declined my Dad's offer and headed on out to the truck. I let me attention slip and backing out of the driveway I managed to back into my Dad's truck. Very frustrated now, I get out with my flashlight and discover I have left a nice big crease in the front fender. With hat in hand I go back to the kitchen where my Dad is still enjoying his coffee and I say, "Dad, I was not paying attention and backed into your truck and your front quarter panel is damaged, I'm sorry." My Dad without hesitation responded, "you sure you won't take some of these oranges, they are really fresh." I protested that maybe he was not hearing me. It was then my Dad taught his lesson. "Son, my truck can be fixed, I am not worried about that. What you are doing this morning is for your friend. Go enjoy the hunt and don't think another thing about it... and take some oranges."

I have always wondered what my reaction would have been if the shoe was on the other foot. My Dad's footprints are giant to me and I'm not sure I would have shown his grace or much less used it to teach a lesson. You see, trucks can indeed be fixed (in the case of my Dad he drove that truck for 200,000 miles and never had it fixed) and relationships are simply worth more than possessions. It was a powerful lesson for me as a young man and one that has stuck with me. Relationships are important. Everything else – possessions, hobbies, wants, politics, etc. – is secondary. Those of us

employed by the City are public servants first and foremost. We are in the people business which is built on relationships. We provide a diverse set of public services – Library, Parks, Police, Fire, Streets, Drainage Wastewater, Water, Planning, Building Inspection, Human Resources, Finance, Courts and Code Enforcement. While the services we provide are wide ranging they all have one commonality – they are all about serving people and serving them well. As such, making and maintaining relationships is of the utmost importance. The best of us can lose focus of that in dealing with the issues that we face daily. I hope when life hands you lemons you'll remember the story of the oranges. A story that for me resets my mindset on the importance of relationships.
