Message from the Manager:

If you follow much of my writing over the years, it comes as no surprise that Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is one of my historical mentors. We celebrate Dr. King on the third Monday in January every year. It is a holiday that is meant to be an active day of celebration where we are called to serve each other! How fitting! Dr. King rose up and spoke out about civil rights during a time in our history where it was unacceptable and very dangerous to do so. He put his life on the line to serve others and to change the world for all of us. In his famous "I have a Dream" speech given at the Lincoln Memorial in 1963, Dr. King states "... that one day right down in Alabama little black boys and black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls as sisters and brothers." Dr. King therein painted a beautiful destination for us all. A destination we often have fallen short of, but one for which it is ever worth striving. Dr. King envisioned and painted his vision for us all of what unity looks like. Dr. King's life was spent striving to achieve that vision even through all the perils he faced. What I'd like us all to focus on, and another lesson we can learn from his life, is how he went about his mission – peacefully. Dr. King peacefully shook the United States to its core on civil rights. He achieved so much change in his tragically short life because his methods were so successful.

Dr. King once stated, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that. Hate multiplies hate, violence multiplies violence, and toughness multiplies toughness in a descending spiral of destruction ... The chain reaction of evil - hate begetting hate, wars producing more wars - must be broken, or we shall be plunged into the dark abyss of annihilation." As a nation and a people, are we truly hearing the words that Dr. King spoke?

My heart has been heavy and weary for our Country. We have witnessed unrest all over the Country and from every possible political view point. One common theme among it all is the use of force to assert a belief – force of speech and often the force of action. Famous physicist Sir Isaac Newton's third law of motion states that for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction. While I think it also applies in terms of public interaction, it should be modified to "for every action there is an opposite but greater reaction." Cue up the story of the Hatfield and McCoy feud. Humans don't just react back with the same energy or hate thrown at them. They counter with greater energy or hate and the spiral that Dr. King so well spoke of begins.

The good news is Dr. King didn't just describe the human condition, he gave us the answer to our issues with each other. Dr. King's answer is simple, "Hate begets hate; violence begets violence; toughness begets a greater toughness. We must meet the forces of hate with the power of love." If we are to break the spiral the answer is not further violence. The answer is love.

So what does it mean to love others? We often think of love in terms of how we feel for our spouse, significant other or family. I challenge you to broaden your definition of love to that of a verb, or an action if you will. What are you actively doing to show others you care for them? It can be as small as a kind word that lifts the spirits of others. I know I have found that to be so true over this past year! Do you know someone in need that you can supply your knowledge or resources to assist? In doing these things you are applying the "love" that Dr. King spoke of.

We are blessed to be public servants because serving others is what we get to do every day. Don't let yourself get lost in the troubles of this world – look back through history they have always been with us! Focus on what you can impact and that is the lives of those around you that you can

serve. In doing that, you will spur others through your actions such that your service grows exponentially. Just like a ripple on a pond – it will stretch out much greater than just the acts you perform for others and through the actions of those you spur you will even benefit (love) people you have never met. What an amazing blessing we are to others when we do that! I am confident we are doing just that – impacting those with us now in the moment, those that are unseen by us, and those that will come after us. Thank you for allowing me to be a part of such a great team of servants!
